Welcome to Namibia!

Your Namibian adventure begins the moment you touch down at Walvis Bay International Airport. After clearing customs and collecting your luggage, a comfortable shuttle will be waiting to transfer you to your luxury hotel in Swakopmund. The drive itself is a treat—stretching past vast desert plains and the cool Atlantic breeze.

Once settled, you'll have the afternoon to explore Swakopmund, this will give you the opportunity for those last-minute shopping before the tour starts. Swakopmund town steeped in German colonial history, blending European architecture with African charm. Palm-lined streets, seaside promenades, and distinct German-style buildings make Swakopmund one of the most photogenic towns in Namibia.

In the evening, we'll gather for a "meet and greet" over a hearty welcome dinner featuring delicious Namibian flavors and perhaps a cold Windhoek Lager. You'll meet the tour team and fellow riders, get introduced to your Harley-Davidson Pan American 1250cc offroad motorcycle, and review the itinerary.

Highlights:

Arrival - Walvis Bay International Airport:

Embark on an unforgettable adventure as you arrive in Namibia, one of Africa's most captivating destinations. Your journey begins at Walvis Bay International Airport (WVB), the gateway to Namibia's pristine coastline and desert wonders. Located approximately 15 km east of Walvis Bay, the airport offers a warm and welcoming atmosphere, designed to ease you into the rhythm of Namibian hospitality. The airport is modern and efficient, with easy customs procedures and helpful staff ready to assist you.

Upon arrival, you'll be greeted by a representative holding a personalized welcome sign, ensuring a smooth and hassle-free transition from the airport to your luxury shuttle. The shuttle is a premium, air-conditioned vehicle designed for comfort and relaxation after your flight. Settle into plush leather seating, enjoy complimentary refreshments, and soak in the stunning desert landscape through panoramic windows as you begin your journey to Swakopmund. Your driver, a local expert, will share fascinating insights about the region's history, culture, and natural wonders along the way, setting the tone for the incredible adventure ahead.

Walvis Bay - A historic coastal Gem:

As you leave the airport, you'll pass through Walvis Bay, Namibia's only deep-water harbor and one of the country's most important ports. The town's history is deeply tied to maritime trade and colonial expansion. First discovered by Portuguese explorers in 1487 when Bartolomeu Dias anchored in the bay, Walvis Bay became a strategic trading post due to its sheltered lagoon and abundant marine life. The British annexed the area in 1878 to secure whaling and fishing rights, and later, it became part of South Africa during colonial rule. Today, Walvis Bay is a vibrant coastal town, known for its oyster farms, salt pans, and bustling fishing industry.

As you pass through Walvis Bay, you may catch a glimpse of the famous Walvis Bay Lagoon, a Ramsar wetland site known for its massive flocks of flamingos and pelicans. The calm waters and nutrient-rich ecosystem make this one of the most important bird sanctuaries in Southern Africa. The salt pans, shimmering under the sun, are some of the largest in the world and produce over 400,000 tons of salt annually.

Dune 7- A majestic Natural Wonder:

Just a short distance from Walvis Bay, you'll encounter the towering **Dune 7**, the tallest dune in Namibia, standing at approximately **383 meters (1,256 feet).** Dune 7 is named because it's the seventh dune inland from the Atlantic Ocean. It holds historical and cultural significance for the local Nama and Damara people, who have inhabited this region for centuries. Climbing Dune 7 is a popular activity for adventurers, offering a challenging ascent through soft sand. Reaching the summit rewards you with breathtaking panoramic views of the surrounding desert and coastline. The reddish-orange hue of the sand shifts with the changing light, creating a mesmerizing visual display. The area is also a hotspot for sandboarding and quad biking, providing an adrenaline-filled introduction to Namibia's iconic desert terrain.

Scenic Route- Walvis Bay to Swakopmund:

As you leave Dune 7 behind, the road to Swakopmund offers a striking contrast between the endless dunes of the Namib Desert on your left and the rugged Atlantic Ocean coastline on your right. The Namib Desert is estimated to be over 55 million years old, making it the oldest desert on Earth. Its vast sea of shifting sand dunes and arid plains has created one of the most unique ecosystems in the world, home to desert-adapted wildlife such as oryx, jackals, and the elusive brown hyena.

This scenic route is part of the Dorob National Park, a protected area established in 2010 to conserve Namibia's fragile coastal ecosystem. Along the way, you'll pass through striking gravel plains and dry riverbeds lined with sparse desert flora like the hardy Welwitschia mirabilis – a plant that can live for over 1,500 years. The route also offers breathtaking views of the Atlantic Ocean, where powerful waves crash against the rugged coastline. Keep an eye out for Cape fur seals sunning themselves on the rocky outcrops and dolphins playing in the surf.

Swakopmund:

After approximately 40 km of scenic driving, you'll arrive in Swakopmund, one of Namibia's most charming and historic towns. Founded in 1892 as the main port for German South- West Africa, Swakopmund retains its colonial-era architecture, creating a striking blend of European charm and African character. The wide palm-lined streets, German-style half-timbered buildings, and colorful facades give the town a distinctive and timeless appeal.

Meet and greet:

Meet and greet your fellow riders, get introduced to your Harley-Davidson Pan American 1250cc offroad motorcycle, and review the itinerary. This will also allow you time for that last minute shopping before the guided tour commences. You'll be introduced to your team, which will include two (2) professional guides, a medical -first responder and a photographer.

Day 2: Swakopmund → Henties Bay → St Nowhere

Lunch at De Duine Henties bay – departure time 13h00
Arrive at St Nowhere at 17 h00
Dinner under the stars at 20h00
Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way.
Distance: ≈ 180 km

After breakfast, your adventure begins along the legendary Skeleton Coast, named after the numerous shipwrecks and whale skeletons that litter their desolate shores. The cold Benguela Current creates a foggy, eerie atmosphere, adding to the coast's mystique.

The first stop is the quirky settlement of Wlotzkasbaken, known for its colorful beach houses and salt pans. From there, visit the Zeila Shipwreck, a fishing trawler stranded in 2008, now home to cormorants and pelicans.

Lunch at De Duine Hotel in Henties Bay offers a taste of fresh Atlantic seafood. Afterward, ride to Cape Cross, where Portuguese explorer Diego Cão planted a cross in 1486 during his voyage of discovery. Cape Cross is now home to one of the largest Cape fur seal colonies in the world, with over 100,000 seals basking on the rocks.

The day ends with beachside camping at St Nowhere, where you'll enjoy a traditional Namibian-style braai under the stars, listening to the sound of crashing waves.

Highlights:

Departing Swakopmund:

The day starts with an early departure from Swakopmund, where the salty morning mist rolls in from the Atlantic. Riding through the town's charming German colonial streets, you'll pass pastel-colored buildings, palm-lined avenues, and the iconic Swakopmund Jetty. Heading north along the coastal gravel road, you'll follow the edge of the Atlantic Ocean, with the surf crashing on one side and the endless dunes of the Namib Desert stretching out on the other.

Wlotzkasbaken:

About 30 km north of Swakopmund, you'll pass the quirky settlement of Wlotzkasbaken — a small fishing village known for its unique character. The village consists of scattered holiday homes and no commercial activity, preserving its peaceful atmosphere. The houses here are built in unconventional shapes, reflecting the eccentric personality of the residents. Stop for a quick photo and enjoy the contrast between the crashing waves and the silent desert beyond.

Zeila Shipwreck:

Further along the Skeleton Coast, you'll encounter the Zeila Shipwreck, one of Namibia's most photogenic maritime relics. The Zeila ran aground in 2008 while being towed to India for scrap. Now rusting in the surf, it's a haunting reminder of the treacherous Atlantic coastline — often referred to as the "Graveyard of Ships." The wreck is frequently surrounded by cormorants and other seabirds, making it a great spot for wildlife photography.

Henties Bay:

After approximately 70 km, you'll reach Henties Bay, a laid-back coastal town known for its excellent fishing and relaxed atmosphere. The town developed around its rich fishing waters, attracting anglers from across southern Africa. Henties Bay has a deep history tied to early exploration and trade along the Skeleton Coast.

Key stops in Henties Bay include:

The Duine Hotel:

The Duine Hotel is one of the most iconic landmarks in Henties Bay. Established in the early 1950s, the Duine Hotel has long been a favorite stopover for travelers and fishermen. It holds a rich history tied to the town's early days as a modest fishing outpost. Over the decades, the hotel has welcomed everyone from adventurers and diamond prospectors to modern tourists seeking refuge from the coastal winds. Its rustic charm and well-preserved colonial-style architecture make it a nostalgic stop for anyone familiar with Namibia's coastal history.

The Gallows History:

Henties Bay also carries an intriguing and somewhat dark history, tied to The Gallows. In the early days of the settlement, the Gallows were a symbol of law and order, a site where justice was meted out. During colonial rule, and even after Namibia's independence, the Gallows was used for executions — particularly for criminals who had violated colonial law. Today, the Gallows remains as a historical landmark, offering a glimpse into the harsh and often brutal realities of Namibia's colonial past. It stands as a reminder of the legacy of colonialism and strict control over the region.

Gemstone Fusion Rock Gallery:

The Gemstone Fusion Rock Gallery showcases an extraordinary collection of locally sourced gemstones, crystals, and minerals. Namibia is world-renowned for its rich deposits of semi-precious stones like tourmaline, amethyst, and aquamarine. The gallery not only displays these beautiful natural creations but also explains the geological processes that formed them over millions of years. Visitors can purchase unique jewelry and decorative pieces crafted from the local stones — a perfect souvenir reflecting Namibia's natural wealth.

Cape Cross and Cape Cross Seal Colony:

It was during Diego Cão -his second voyage, in 1484–1486, Cão reached Cape Cross in January 1486, being the first European to visit this area. He is known to have erected two *padrões* in the areas beyond his first voyage, one in Monte Negro, and the second at Cape Cross. The current name of the place is derived from this *padrão*. What can today be found at Cape Cross are two replicas of that first cross

Cape Cross is a protected area owned by the government of Namibia under the name Cape Cross Seal Reserve. The reserve is the home of one of the largest colonies of Cape fur seals in the world. Cape Cross is one of two main sites in Namibia (the other is in Lüderitz) where seals are culled, partly for selling their hides and partly for protecting the fish stock

Turn Inland - Namib Gravel Plains:

Leaving Henties Bay, you'll head east into the Namib's barren interior. The landscape quickly changes from the cool, moist coastal air to the dry, sunbaked plains of the Namib Desert. The gravel road cuts through a vast expanse of pale, rocky desert, punctuated only by the occasional acacia tree or desert shrub.

The Namib Gravel Plains stretch to the horizon, creating a sense of vastness and isolation. Despite the harsh environment, you may spot desert-adapted wildlife such as:

- Oryx Their striking black and white markings and long horns make them one of Namibia's most iconic animals.
- Springbok Often seen in small herds grazing on sparse desert vegetation.
- Ostriches Their long legs and powerful strides allow them to cover large distances in search of food.

Day 3: St Nowhere → Skeleton Coast → Springbokwasser → Twyfelfontein Lodge

Accommodation: Twyfelfontein Lodge

Breakfast before leaving for Twyfelfontein at 8h00

Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at Twyfelfontein Buffet dinner at 19h00

Snacks and Beverages will be supplied along the way.

Distance: ≈ 240 km

Wake up to the sound of the Atlantic and begin your ride along the remote Skeleton Coast. The desolate landscape features rusting shipwrecks, whale bones, and abandoned mining outposts -a haunting reminders of nature's power.

Stop for a light lunch at Springbokwasser, a former mining station deserted outpost, surrounded by rugged hills and desert plains.

Arrive at Twyfelfontein, home to over 2,500 ancient rock engravings dating back more than 6,000 years. A guided tour will reveal the symbolic art of the San people, depicting animals, hunting scenes, and spiritual symbols. Nearby, visit the striking geological formations of the Organ Pipes and the Burnt Mountain, which glows red and purple at sunset.

Dinner at the lodge will feature local game and regional flavors.

Highlights:

Skeleton Coast's Shipwrecks and Desert Landscape

The Skeleton Coast is the northern part of the Atlantic coast of Namibia. Immediately south of Angola, it stretches from the Kunene River to the Swakop River, although the name is sometimes used to describe the entire Namib Desert coast. The indigenous San people (formerly known as Bushmen), of the Namibian interior called the region "The Land God Made in Anger", while Portuguese sailors once referred to it as "The Gates of Hell", seance scattered with shipwrecks and whale bones.

Springbokwasser:

Springbokwasser was once an important patrol station during Namibia's colonial era, marking the transition from the foggy coast to the arid interior. The region is named after the springbok that roam the plains, often seen in large herds along the route. This section of the ride offers a true off-road experience — sandy trails, river crossings, and rugged desert terrain. The ride through Springbokwasser is where you'll feel the full power of the Harley-Davidson as it grips the loose terrain beneath you.

Twyfelfontein - A UNESCO- World Heritage Site:

Ancient Rock Art: Twyfelfontein is home to one of the most significant collections of prehistoric rock engravings in Africa. With over 2,500 petroglyphs, the site provides a window into the lives of early human societies. The artwork, which includes animals, hunting scenes, and spiritual symbols, is believed to be 6,000 years old.

UNESCO World Heritage Site: Twyfelfontein is a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site due to its cultural significance. As you explore the area, you'll gain insight into the deep history of the San people who created these engravings.

Scenic Views: The area is surrounded by stunning desert vistas, with dramatic rock formations and vast plains. It's a perfect place for a peaceful, reflective stop after the long day of riding.

Burnt Mountain:

Burnt Mountain, a sheet of dolerite, an igneous rock associated with volcanic activity that occurred in the area some 120 million years ago

The Organ Pipes

The "Organ Pipes" is a rock formation that comprises a group of columnar basalts resembling organ pipes. The Organ Pipes were formed about 150 million years ago as the result of the intrusion of liquid lava into a slate rock formation, which was exposed over time by erosion.

Day 4: Twyfelfontein → Brandberg White Lady Lodge
Accommodation: Brandberg White Lady Lodge
Breakfast before leaving for Brandberg White Lady Lodge at 8h00
Lunch at 13h00
Arrive at Brandberg White Lady Lodge
Dinner at 19h00
Snacks and Beverages will be supplied along the way.
Distance: ≈ 160 km

After breakfast, head toward Brandberg Massif (2,573 meters), Namibia's highest mountain. The ride cuts through desert plains where sightings of desert-adapted elephants, oryx, and springbok is possible.

A guided hike leads to the White Lady Rock Painting, a mysterious and well-preserved piece of San rock art believed to be over 2,000 years old. The painting is part of a larger collection depicting ancient hunting rituals and spiritual ceremonies.

Relax at the lodge pool or take a sunset walk through the rugged terrain. Dinner will feature locally sourced game and fresh vegetables.

Highlights:

Desert-Adapted Elephants:

Namibia's desert-adapted wildlife and landscapes offer a remarkable glimpse into nature's resilience and beauty. In the arid expanses of the Namib and Kalahari Deserts, you'll encounter species uniquely evolved to thrive in these extreme conditions. From the iconic desert-adapted elephants that roam the dry riverbeds of Damaraland to the hardy oryx and springbok navigating the sandy dunes, the wildlife of Namibia showcases incredible survival strategies. Even predators like lions and hyenas have adapted to the harsh desert environment, blending into the rugged terrain. Beyond the animals, the plant life is equally fascinating, with the ancient Welwitschia mirabilis, some over 1,500 years old, standing as living proof of the desert's enduring strength. Experiencing Namibia's desert-adapted ecosystems firsthand is an unforgettable encounter with nature at its most resilient.

Brandberg Massif - Namibia's highest mountain:

The Brandberg Mountain Massif is Namibia's highest peak, and a sacred natural landmark steeped in history and geological wonder. Towering at 2,573 meters, this imposing granite formation is not only a striking sight against the desert skyline but also a treasure trove of ancient art and cultural significance. The mountain's name, meaning "Fire Mountain," comes from the dramatic glow it gives off at sunset, as the granite reflects the sun's fading light in fiery hues. For adventurers and culture enthusiasts alike, the Brandberg offers rewarding hikes through rugged terrain, leading to hidden caves and rock shelters adorned with prehistoric rock art. The breathtaking views from the summit and the profound sense of history beneath your feet make Brandberg Mountain an essential stop for any traveller seeking both natural beauty and cultural dept

White Lady Rock Painting - Ancient San rock art:

The White Lady rock painting, located in the Brandberg Mountain, is one of Namibia's most famous prehistoric artworks. Estimated to be over 2,000 years old, the painting depicts a human figure adorned with ceremonial attire, surrounded by animals and other symbolic markings. Despite its name, the figure is believed to represent a shaman or spiritual leader rather than a woman. The site's spiritual significance and the skilful detail of the artwork provide a window into the lives and beliefs of Namibia's early inhabitants. Visiting the White Lady is more than just viewing ancient art — it's stepping into the sacred history of Namibia's indigenous cultures.

Desert Sunset:

It is nearly impossible to capture the exact amount of magic. The magic of a Namibian desert sunset can only be measured by how much it took your breath away. As the day fades an empty canvas is softly painted with a midnight blue and a mixture of jaded pinks, candy apples red and shades of orange and the grand final of colors bursting into a star dust yellow

Day 5: Brandberg White Lady Lodge → Spitzkoppe
Accommodation: Spitzkoppe Lodge
Breakfast before leaving for Brandberg White Lady Lodge at 8h00
Lunch at 13h00
Arrive at Spitzkoppe Lodge
Buffet dinner at 19h00
Snacks and Beverages will be supplied along the way.
Distance: ≈ 180 km

Ride toward the striking granite peaks of Spitzkoppe, rising nearly 1,800 meters from the desert floor. These ancient formations are over 700 million years old.

Explore the Bushman's Paradise caves, where you'll find ancient rock art depicting hunting scenes and religious rituals. Visit the iconic Bridge Rock Formation, a natural archway carved by centuries of wind and erosion.

After exploring the area, settle into your lodge and enjoy a peaceful evening under the star-studded Namibian sky.

Highlights:

Spitzkoppe - The "Matterhorn of Namibia":

Spitzkoppe, known as the "Matterhorn of Namibia," is one of the country's most iconic landmarks. Rising abruptly from the desert floor, its dramatic granite peaks reach up to 1,728 meters above sea level. The mountain's ancient rock formations, estimated to be over 120 million years old, create a striking contrast against the surrounding flat plains. Climbers and hikers are drawn to Spitzkoppe for its challenging routes and panoramic views, while photographers revel in the mountain's changing hues at dawn and dusk. The sheer beauty and isolation of Spitzkoppe make it an unmissable stop on any Namibian adventure.

Bushman's Paradise - Ancient rock art:

Deep within the heart of Namibia lies the Bushman's Paradise, a sacred site preserving some of the most important ancient rock art in Africa. This open-air gallery of petroglyphs and paintings offers a rare glimpse into the lives and spiritual practices of the indigenous San people, who created these artworks thousands of years ago.

The depictions of animals, human figures, and hunting scenes reflect the deep connection between the early inhabitants and the land they depended on for survival. The most famous of these is the White Lady of Brandberg, a striking figure that continues to inspire mystery and debate among historians.

Exploring Bushman's Paradise is more than just a walk-through history—it's a profound journey into the artistic and spiritual legacy of Namibia's earliest people.

The Bridge Rock Formation:

The Bridge Rock Formation at Spitzkoppe is a stunning natural arch carved over centuries by wind and erosion. This massive granite arch stretches gracefully across the rocky landscape, offering a breathtaking view of the surrounding mountains and desert. Its unique shape and location make it a favorite spot for photographers and adventurers alike.

The play of light and shadow across the arch at sunrise and sunset creates a magical and almost mystical atmosphere. Walking beneath this natural wonder is both humbling and awe-inspiring — a reminder of the incredible power of nature and the passage of time. More than 100 million years ago, this mountain range was formed from volcanic activity.

The softer cap rock was eroded away over millions of years by wind erosion until only the hard granite rock remained in the form of sometimes very bizarre rock formations. The highlight is the large rock arch (The Bridge).

Along the way, you might spot desert-adapted wildlife such as oryx and springbok grazing against the rocky landscape. As you approach Swakopmund, the cool Atlantic breeze welcomes you, and the dramatic contrast between the barren desert and the lively coastal town becomes strikingly apparent. The historic German colonial architecture of Swakopmund, combined with its vibrant beachside atmosphere, marks the perfect ending to a scenic and adventurous ride.

Return to Swakopmund for last-minute sightseeing and shopping at the local market. A farewell dinner at a seaside restaurant will provide the perfect setting to share highlights and memories with your fellow riders.

Highlights:

Desert Landscapes:

Namibia's desert landscape is a breathtaking expanse of ever-shifting dunes, rugged mountains, and vast plains that stretch as far as the eye can see. The iconic red sands of the Namib Desert, believed to be over 55 million years old, create a striking contrast against the deep blue sky. Its two long, leathery leaves grow continuously throughout its lifespan, giving it a wild and twisted appearance. Discovered by Austrian botanist Friedrich Welwitsch in 1859, the plant is a true survivor of the desert. Its ability to extract moisture from morning fog makes it an incredible example of adaptation. Seeing the Welwitschia in its natural habitat is a testament to nature's resilience and a highlight for any botanist or nature lover.

Namib Desert Wildlife - Oryx, springbok, and jackals:

Namibia's diverse wildlife is a testament to the desert's ability to sustain life in even the harshest environments. The oryx, with its striking black and white markings and long, straight horns, is the country's national animal, perfectly adapted to the desert heat. Springbok, known for their impressive leaps, are often seen grazing in small herds across the arid plains. The cunning jackal, with its sharp eyes and keen sense of smell, is a common sight near campfires and lodges. Towering ostriches, the largest birds in the world, stride across the desert with surprising speed and elegance. Experiencing Namibia's wildlife in its natural setting offers a rare and intimate encounter with the rhythms of the wild.

Swakopmund Market and Cultural Experience:
