Upon arrival at Windhoek Hosea Kutako Airport, you will be welcomed by one of our experienced guides. Your guide will assist you with sightseeing recommendations and suggest options for a light breakfast, late brunch, or snack to refresh you after your flight. This is also an ideal time to pick up any last-minute essentials before your adventure begins.

Welcome Dinner and Orientation:

In the evening, a buffet-style supper will be served at The Weinberg Hotel. Here, you'll meet your fellow riders and the tour team. The temptation to sample all of Namibia's finest brews is understandable, but a heavy head and a tough ride on rugged rods don't mix well. A clear head will make the road less traveled far more enjoyable.

Day 1: Hosea Kutako Airport → Hotel in Windhoek Accommodation: The Weinberg Hotel Distance: ≈ 80 km, transfer shuttle available Dinner at 19h00

Welcome to Namibia let the ADVENTURE Begin!

Your Namibian adventure starts the moment you touch down at Hosea Kutako International Airport. After clearing customs and collecting your luggage, a comfortable shuttle will be waiting to transfer you to your hotel in Windhoek. This first day is designed to ease you into the rhythm of the trip, giving you time to recover from your travels, double-check that you've got all your essentials (like toiletries, sunblock, and riding gear), and adjust to Namibia's warm and inviting atmosphere.

Once settled at the hotel, you'll have the afternoon to relax, explore a bit of Windhoek if you're up for it, or simply enjoy some downtime before the adventure truly kicks off.

In the evening, we'll gather for a "meet and greet" with the team and fellow riders. Over a hearty welcome dinner — featuring delicious Namibian flavors and perhaps a cold Windhoek Lager — you'll get to know the group and the crew supporting you on this journey. We'll go over the full itinerary, answer any questions, and introduce you to your bike for the tour. This is also a great time to make any last-minute adjustments and ensure you're comfortable with your motorcycle.

Day 2: Windhoek → Kalahari Accommodation: Kalahari Anib Luxury Lodge Buffet breakfast before leaving for Kalahari Anib Lodge 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at Kalahari Anib Lodge at 16 h00 Dinner under the stars at 19h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ≈ 280 km

The ride south toward the Kalahari will be relatively easy, giving you a chance to feel the terrain beneath your wheels and adjust to the pace of the open road. We'll take it slowly and steadily, with several pitstops along the way to soak in the scenery, stretch our legs, and maybe snap a few photos of the golden plains and deep red dunes.

Namibia's landscapes shift subtly but beautifully as you ride — vast grasslands giving way to undulating desert sands, with occasional glimpses of wildlife along the road. This is your time to get a feel for the terrain, your bike, and the group — a chance to bond with fellow adventurers as you share the excitement of the journey ahead.

As the sun begins to dip, we'll reach our lodge in the Kalahari, nestled among the red dunes. After a refreshing swim or a cold drink by the pool, you'll have the option to join in an evening nature drive through the dunes — the perfect opportunity to spot desert wildlife and watch the sunset paint the sand in shades of crimson and gold.

Tonight, we'll gather under a blanket of stars for a delicious meal of local cuisine, swapping stories from the day's ride and building the camaraderie that will carry us through the rest of this incredible adventure. This is just the beginning — tomorrow, the desert awaits!

Highlights:

- Getting comfortable with your bike and the terrain
- Relaxed ride through the striking Kalahari Desert
- Evening nature drive through red dunes

Day 3: Kalahari → Namib Desert Accommodation: The Namib Desert Lodge Buffet breakfast before leaving for The Namib Desert Lodge at 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at The Namib Desert Lodge Dinner at 19 h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ≈ 332 km

Leaving the Kalahari behind, today's route takes you westward through some of Namibia's most striking and diverse landscapes, transitioning from the red sands of the Kalahari Desert to the golden plains and rugged terrain of the Namib Desert. The journey will immerse you in a stunning blend of open savanna, dry riverbeds, and ancient mountain ranges — all under Namibia's famously vast and impossibly blue skies.

By late afternoon, you'll arrive at your luxurious lodge near the Namib Desert — a peaceful retreat set against the backdrop of petrified dunes and sweeping desert vistas. After a refreshing dip in the pool or a cold drink on the terrace, you'll have the option to join a sunset walk through the petrified dunes — a surreal landscape of ancient, wind-sculpted formations that glow red and orange as the day comes to a close.

As night falls, you'll be treated to a hearty meal under a sky blazing with stars — the kind of starlit sky only the Namib Desert can offer. This is the heart of Namibia — timeless, vast, and breathtakingly beautiful.

Highlights:

Hardap Dam and Hardap Nature Reserve (Optional Detour):

A short distance from Mariental lies Hardap Dam, Namibia's largest reservoir, which holds back the waters of the Fish River. If time allows, this is a worthwhile detour. The dam is surrounded by the Hardap Nature Reserve, home to black rhinos, giraffes, kudu, and springbok. The views over the water against the arid desert backdrop make for a striking contrast and a perfect photo opportunity.

Remnants of the German Colonial Era:

As you ride further west, you'll pass through small towns and settlements that bear traces of Namibia's colonial history. Towns like Maltahöhe and Bethanie were established as missionary stations and trading posts during the late 19th century under German rule. The architecture in these areas often reflects the influence of German settlers, with whitewashed churches and colonial-style buildings standing as a reminder of this period.

Duwisib Castle (Optional Stop):

A small but fascinating historical site on route is Duwisib Castle, a medieval-style fortress built in 1909 by Baron Hansheinrich von Wolf, a German military officer. The castle was constructed with imported materials from Germany and has been remarkably preserved. Inside, you can view period furniture and artifacts, offering a glimpse into the lifestyle of early European settlers in Namibia.

Mesosaurus Fossil Site (Near Maltahöhe):

For those interested in prehistoric history, a stop at the Mesosaurus Fossil Site offers a fascinating look at some of the world's oldest reptile fossils, dating back over 270 million years. The site also features striking dolerite rock formations that have weathered into unusual column-like structures.

Tsaris Pass:

As the desert terrain begins to unfold, you'll climb the Tsaris Pass — a rugged and winding stretch that offers panoramic views of the desert plains stretching toward the horizon. The climb is steady but rewarding, with epic views of Namibia's geological formations laid bare in layers of red and brown sandstone.

Approach the Namib Desert:

As you near the Namib Desert, the terrain transforms dramatically — wide gravel plains stretch out before you, with isolated mountains and distant sand dunes framing the horizon. Keep an eye out for oryx, springbok, and ostriches, which are well-adapted to the harsh desert environment. The Namib's golden hues deepen as the sun starts to set, casting long shadows across the plains.

Day 4: Namib Desert → Rostock Ritz Accommodation: Rostock Ritz Lodge Buffet breakfast before leaving for The Rock Ritz Lodge at 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at 1 Rostock Ritz Lodge Dinner at 19h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ≈ 85 km

Today's ride takes you deeper into the heart of Namibia's desert landscapes, transitioning from the golden plains near the Namib Desert Lodge to the rugged, rocky terrain of the central Namib. The route features wide gravel roads that wind through dramatic desert hills, flanked by ancient mountains and dry riverbeds. This stretch of road is all about wide-open spaces, endless horizons, and the deep silence of the desert — broken only by the sound of your tires crunching over gravel.

By late afternoon, you'll arrive at your lodge in the Rostock area, set against the dramatic backdrop of rocky desert hills. The lodge is perched on a rise, offering sweeping views of the surrounding plains and distant mountains. After settling in, you'll have the option to take a short afternoon ride or join a guided nature hike to explore the local flora and fauna — including ancient desert plants and possibly even Hartmann's Mountain zebras.

As the sun sinks below the horizon, the desert comes alive with the sounds of the night — distant jackals calling and the whisper of the desert wind. Dinner will be served under a starlit sky, and with little to no light pollution, you'll have the chance to witness one of the most dazzling night skies in the world.

Highlights:

Naukluft Mountains:

Shortly after leaving the Namib Desert Lodge, you'll begin to approach the rugged Naukluft Mountains — part of the Namib-Naukluft National Park, one of the largest conservation areas in Africa. The mountains rise dramatically from the desert floor, their sharp ridges and deep ravines carved over millions of years by wind and water. The changing light throughout the day paints the mountains in shades of red, purple, and gold — making this section one of the most visually striking parts of the journey.

Solitaire:

A must-stop on this route is the quirky desert outpost of Solitaire — famous for its rustic charm and legendary apple pie. Solitaire is little more than a petrol station, a bakery, and a scattering of rusting vintage cars — but it's become a favorite stop for travelers crossing the desert. Grab a coffee and a slice of apple pie at the Solitaire Bakery (known internationally) and take a few moments to explore the weathered cars and old gas pumps that give the place its character.

Tropic of Capricorn:

Shortly after Solitaire, you'll cross the Tropic of Capricorn — marked by a simple sign where travelers often stop for a photo. The line marks the southern boundary of the tropics, and it's a symbolic point on your journey, highlighting just how deep into the desert you've come.

Gaub Pass:

From the Tropic of Capricorn, the route descends into the dramatic Gaub Pass — a twisting, rocky stretch of road that cuts through a deep canyon carved by ancient geological forces. The pass offers incredible views of layered rock formations and stark desert terrain. The descent can be a thrilling ride, with fast turns and breathtaking drops into the canyon below.

Kuiseb Pass:

Shortly after the Gaub Pass, you'll tackle the Kuiseb Pass — another rugged stretch of road that crosses the Kuiseb River (which is usually dry but can flood during the rainy season). The Kuiseb River played a pivotal role in the survival of two German geologists, Henno Martin and Hermann Korn, who took refuge in the riverbed during World War II — a story immortalized in the book "The Sheltering Desert." The steep cliffs and sharp bends of the pass provide breathtaking views, and you may spot mountain zebras or klipspringers along the rocky slopes.

Open Gravel Plains:

After the Kuiseb Pass, the landscape opens up into vast gravel plains — a seemingly endless stretch of open desert where the horizon seems to melt into the sky. This section is where Namibia's "big sky" effect really takes hold — with no signs of human activity except for the road beneath your wheels and the occasional herd of oryx or springbok in the distance. The changing light creates a spectacular display of color across the plains, from soft pinks and oranges to deep purples as the sun sets.

Day 5 & 6: Rock Ritz → Swakopmund Accommodation: The Stiltz Hotel Buffet breakfast before leaving for The Stiltz Hotel at 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at The Stiltz Hotel Dinner at 19h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ~ 225 km

Today's ride takes you on a breathtaking transition from Namibia's inland desert landscapes to the cool, misty shores of the Atlantic Ocean. Leaving the rugged desert hills behind, you'll descend gradually toward the coast, with each kilometer revealing a fascinating shift in terrain, climate, and scenery. From the sun-scorched plains of the Namib to the foggy, salt-scented air of Swakopmund, this stretch showcases Namibia's remarkable geographic contrasts.

Your accommodation for the two is at The Stiltz, a unique eco-lodge perched on wooden stilts overlooking the Swakop River mouth and the Atlantic Ocean. The thatched-roof bungalows offer panoramic views of the surrounding wetlands and the ocean — and if you're lucky, you might spot flamingos and pelicans from your private deck.

After settling in, you'll have the evening to explore Swakopmund. Stroll along the beach promenade, visit the historic Swakopmund Jetty, or enjoy a sunset drink at one of the beachfront bars. Dinner options include fresh Atlantic seafood and German-inspired dishes — a culinary highlight of the trip.

Highlights:

Moon Landscape:

As you ride west, the terrain begins to shift into a surreal, almost otherworldly landscape known as the Moon Landscape. This area was shaped by millions of years of erosion by the Swakop River, leaving behind deep valleys, jagged ridges, and barren, undulating hills that resemble the surface of the moon. The lack of vegetation and the monochromatic tones of the rock create a stark but captivating beauty.

Welwitschia Plains:

The Moon Landscape is home to one of Namibia's most extraordinary natural wonders — the ancient Welwitschia plant. This plant, which can live for over 1,500 years, has adapted to survive in harsh desert conditions by drawing moisture from the coastal fog. Some of the largest specimens are found in this area, including the famous "Welwitschia Mirabilis," which is estimated to be over 1,000 years old. The twisted, sprawling leaves of these ancient plants are a striking reminder of the desert's ability to sustain life

Goanikontes Oasis:

Nestled in the heart of the Moon Landscape is the historic Goanikontes Oasis — a lush green patch surrounded by the barren desert. The oasis was established as a resting point for early explorers and traders. Today, it offers a peaceful spot to relax with a cold drink and enjoy the contrast between the verdant palm trees and the surrounding desert hills.

Swakop River Canyon:

As you approach the coast, the road follows the dry bed of the Swakop River, which cuts a dramatic canyon through the desert. The riverbed is often dotted with acacia trees and desert-adapted wildlife such as springbok and ostriches. This section of the route offers incredible views of the canyon walls and the distant shimmer of the Atlantic Ocean.

The Atlantic Coastline:

After hours of desert riding, the first sight of the Atlantic Ocean is a dramatic and emotional moment. The temperature drops noticeably as you descend toward the coast, with cool sea breezes replacing the dry desert heat. The contrast between the barren desert and the ocean's deep blue expanse is one of Namibia's most striking natural juxtapositions.

Arrival in Swakopmund:

You'll arrive in Swakopmund, Namibia's premier coastal town, by late afternoon. Founded in 1892 as a German colonial port, Swakopmund retains much of its colonial architecture and European charm. Colorful half-timbered houses, palm-lined streets, and wide promenades give the town a relaxed, old-world atmosphere.

Optional Activities in Swakopmund: (bookings and payments on arrival at hotel or lodge)

- Quad Biking & Sandboarding: Take an adrenaline-filled ride through the towering sand dunes just outside town.

- Dolphin and Seal Cruise: Head out to Walvis Bay for a marine safari where you can spot dolphins, seals, and even sunfish.

- Skydiving: For the truly adventurous, take a tandem skydive over the Namib Desert and Atlantic Ocean for unbeatable views.

 Museum and Architecture Tour: Learn about Swakopmund's colonial past and visit the Swakopmund Museum and the iconic Hohenzollern Building.

Day 7: Swakopmund → Spitzkoppe via Henties Accommodation: Spitzkoppe Lodge Buffet breakfast before leaving for Spitzkoppe Lodge at 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at Henties Bay – De Duine Hotel13h00 Arrive at Spitzkoppe Lodge Dinner at 17 h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ≈ 157km

Today's ride will take you from the cool Atlantic coastline at Swakopmund, up along the Skeleton Coast to Henties Bay, before turning inland toward the rugged peaks of Spitzkoppe. This route offers a fascinating blend of natural beauty, colonial history, and stark desert landscapes. The transition from the Atlantic breeze to the dry heat of the interior desert is striking, with every leg of the journey revealing different facets of Namibia's dramatic terrain.

Your accommodation at Spitzkoppe Lodge offers a luxurious and eco-friendly stay at the foot of the peaks. The chalets are built to blend into the natural surroundings, with private terraces offering breathtaking views of the granite formations.

After settling in, you can explore the area with a guided walk to discover hidden rock paintings and caves or simply relax and take in the stillness of the desert. As the sun sets, the sky transforms into a brilliant display of reds and purples, with the silhouette of Spitzkoppe dominating the horizon.

Dinner will be served under the stars, and the absence of light pollution makes Spitzkoppe one of the best stargazing spots in the world. The Milky Way arches overhead in stunning detail — a perfect way to end a day of adventure.

Highlights:

Departing Swakopmund:

The day starts with an early departure from Swakopmund, where the salty morning mist rolls in from the Atlantic. Riding through the town's charming German colonial streets, you'll pass pastel-colored buildings, palm-lined avenues, and the iconic Swakopmund Jetty. Heading north along the coastal gravel road, you'll follow the edge of the Atlantic Ocean, with the surf crashing on one side and the endless dunes of the Namib Desert stretching out on the other.

Wlotzkasbaken:

About 30 km north of Swakopmund, you'll pass the quirky settlement of Wlotzkasbaken — a small fishing village known for its unique character. The village consists of scattered holiday homes and no commercial activity, preserving its peaceful atmosphere. The houses here are built in unconventional shapes, reflecting the eccentric personality of the residents. Stop for a quick photo and enjoy the contrast between the crashing waves and the silent desert beyond.

Zeila Shipwreck:

Further along the Skeleton Coast, you'll encounter the Zeila Shipwreck, one of Namibia's most photogenic maritime relics. The Zeila ran aground in 2008 while being towed to India for scrap. Now rusting in the surf, it's a haunting reminder of the treacherous Atlantic coastline — often referred to as the "Graveyard of Ships." The wreck is frequently surrounded by cormorants and other seabirds, making it a great spot for wildlife photography.

Henties Bay:

After approximately 70 km, you'll reach Henties Bay, a laid-back coastal town known for its excellent fishing and relaxed atmosphere. The town developed around its rich fishing waters, attracting anglers from across southern Africa. Henties Bay has a deep history tied to early exploration and trade along the Skeleton Coast.

Key stops in Henties Bay include:

The Duine Hotel:

The Duine Hotel is one of the most iconic landmarks in Henties Bay. Established in the early 1950s, the Duine Hotel has long been a favorite stopover for travelers and fishermen. It holds a rich history tied to the town's early days as a modest fishing outpost. Over the decades, the hotel has welcomed everyone from adventurers and diamond prospectors to modern tourists seeking refuge from the coastal winds. Its rustic charm and well-preserved colonial-style architecture make it a nostalgic stop for anyone familiar with Namibia's coastal history.

The Gallows History:

Henties Bay also carries an intriguing and somewhat dark history, tied to The Gallows. In the early days of the settlement, the Gallows were a symbol of law and order, a site where justice was meted out. During colonial rule, and even after Namibia's independence, the Gallows was used for executions — particularly for criminals who had violated colonial law. Today, the Gallows remains as a historical landmark, offering a glimpse into the harsh and often brutal realities of Namibia's colonial past. It stands as a reminder of the legacy of colonialism and strict control over the region.

Gemstone Fusion Rock Gallery:

The Gemstone Fusion Rock Gallery showcases an extraordinary collection of locally sourced gemstones, crystals, and minerals. Namibia is world-renowned for its rich deposits of semi-precious stones like tourmaline, amethyst, and aquamarine. The gallery not only displays these beautiful natural creations but also explains the geological processes that formed them over millions of years. Visitors can purchase unique jewelry and decorative pieces crafted from the local stones — a perfect souvenir reflecting Namibia's natural wealth.

Turn Inland - Namib Gravel Plains:

Leaving Henties Bay, you'll head east into the Namib's barren interior. The landscape quickly changes from the cool, moist coastal air to the dry, sunbaked plains of the Namib Desert. The gravel road cuts through a vast expanse of pale, rocky desert, punctuated only by the occasional acacia tree or desert shrub.

The Namib Gravel Plains stretch to the horizon, creating a sense of vastness and isolation. Despite the harsh environment, you may spot desert-adapted wildlife such as:

- Oryx Their striking black and white markings and long horns make them one of Namibia's most iconic animals.
- **Springbok** Often seen in small herds grazing on sparse desert vegetation.
- Ostriches Their long legs and powerful strides allow them to cover large distances in search of food.

Spitzkoppe - Namibia's "Matterhorn"

The final stretch toward Spitzkoppe takes you across more gravel plains, with the massive granite peaks of Spitzkoppe rising dramatically in the distance. Formed over 120 million years ago by volcanic activity, Spitzkoppe smooth, weathered surfaces glow red and orange in the afternoon sun.

Spitzkoppe is not only a geological marvel but also a place of deep cultural significance. The indigenous San people have used the area for centuries as a sacred site, leaving behind detailed rock art depicting animals, hunters, and symbolic shapes. These paintings provide valuable insights into the San's spiritual beliefs and survival techniques.

Optional Activities at Spitzkoppe:

- Rock Climbing: Tackle Spitzkoppe granite faces, known for their technical difficulty and rewarding views.
- San Rock Art Tour: Learn about the ancient rock paintings from a local guide.
- Sunset Hike: Climb to a high vantage point to watch the sun setting over the desert.
- Stargazing: Spitzkoppe dark skies offer some of the best stargazing in the Southern Hemisphere.

Day 8: Spitzkoppe → Midgard Country Estate Lodge Accommodation: Midgard Country Estate Lodge Buffet breakfast before leaving for Midgard Country Lodge at 8h00 Departure time 9h00- Unleash the Adventure Lunch at 13h00 Arrive at Midgard Country Estate Lodge Dinner at 19 h00 Snacks and Beverages will be served along the way. Distance: ≈ 250km

Departing Spitzkoppe Lodge As you leave Spitzkoppe Lodge, the striking granite peaks that have been your backdrop throughout your stay slowly fade into the horizon. You'll begin your ride through the endless desert.

The final stretch of your Namibia adventure takes you from Spitzkoppe Lodge to Midgard Lodge, where you'll reflect on your incredible journey through the Namibian wilderness. This scenic route back to the capital winds through desert landscapes and picturesque valleys, offering one last chance to soak in the raw beauty of this unique country. The gravel roads are smooth and easy to navigate, making for a peaceful ride, and your final destination, Midgard Lodge, promises a relaxing setting to wind down before your journey home.

Arriving at Midgard Lodge after about 250 km of gravel roads, you will reach your final destination in the Khomas Highlands, Midgard Lodge offers a tranquil, luxurious setting with sweeping views of the surrounding valleys and mountains. The lodge is famous for its lush gardens, crystal-clear pools, and rich history, dating back to the 1920s.

The last evening at Midgard Lodge will be filled with good food, good company, and the warmth of shared memories. This will be the time to reflect on the incredible experiences you've had, the landscapes you've conquered, and the friendships you've made along the way. The sense of freedom and adventure will stay with you long after you've left Namibia.

Highlight:

Usakos - Colonial Echoes:

About 30 km from Spitzkoppe, you'll reach the small town of Usakos, and we'll be passing through on our way to Midgard Country Lodge. Once a thriving railway hub during the German colonial period. The town's German-built railway station and historic stone houses reflect Namibia's colonial history. Usakos was established in the early 1900s to support the railway connecting Swakopmund to the copper mines inland. Today, the town is quiet, but it offers a chance to rest, refuel, and enjoy a glimpse into Namibia's colonial past. Passing through arid landscapes and occasionally rolling hills. The gravel road here is smooth and well-maintained, allowing you to take in the serenity of the wide-open spaces.

Through the Desert:

Into the Highlands After passing through the plains of the Namibian desert, you will begin to approach the Khomas Highlands. The transition from the flat desert to the more elevated, rugged terrain of the highlands is dramatic and picturesque. As the road snakes through this region, the rolling hills and lush green valleys create a beautiful contrast to the dry plains you've crossed earlier. The landscape becomes more varied, with occasionally rocky outcrops and hillsides covered in vegetation

End of the Journey:

This is where your Namibia adventure will end. You'll be welcomed to the lodge to relax and unwind before your shuttle departs the following day.

Shuttle and Departure:

After spending the night at Midgard Lodge, a shuttle will be available to take you back to Windhoek, where you can catch your flight home or continue with your onward journey. The shuttle will ensure that you travel in comfort, giving you one last chance to enjoy the Namibian landscape before you say your final goodbyes.
